### BOARD OF TRUSTEES Chairperson's Report

It's not until you sit down to remember the past year that you realise so much has happened.

2014 has been a year of growth, development and strength with many positives. The school roll had a large increase to 450 and with that an increase in staffing and funding which has been utilised throughout the year to support the school in improving student achievement.

The school has had a successful year with great results for our sports teams competing at regional and national competitions. Our newly formed shooting team were placed third in their competition and the strength of many others saw outstanding placings. These are varied from our football & rugby teams to Rock Quest, Maths Olympiad and speech finals.

The 49th Reporoa Exchange hosted by us was a highlight as our teams dominated, thanks to the support of our coaches and managers that give their time to develop our young teams. We look forward to celebrating the milestone of fifty years of this exchange in 2015.

This year we farewell three support staff and wish them well. Our teaching staff have been supportive of each other and through ongoing PLD have grown their skills and strength. The OTA Way has been embedded into the school's routines and culture, with the foundations now in place to see a safer and more respectful environment.

The Board committed to progress in the Year 7/8 area of the School and has seen the 1st stages of the playground and learning area developed. This has been a thirty year wait for the community. We have seen the junior school start to grow their own identity and improve the learning environment. Science and Maths have been taught by subject teachers in the junior school and Maths Whizz was funded for Year 7-10 both have seen improved outcomes.

The Board supported the purchase of Chromebooks which are now used over many subjects and supported the trialling of 'Bring Your Own Devices' in Year 12 & 13. This has complemented the upgraded computer rooms and given more opportunities to students to access the internet based teaching which is supported by classroom learning.

We have invested in new library books and another \$30,000 into other learning areas. Next year the technology block will get some upgrades.



With a positive ERO report endorsing the school's future direction and the continual improvement in school wide results, next year will see big gains from the hard work put into the school by all. The Board would like to thank our senior managers, teaching and support staff, students and families in helping to build a wonderful school.

Our sincere wishes to all students sitting final exams and congratulations to everyone on their achievements during the year. Have a well earned Christmas holiday. 2015 will be an exciting year.

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





A great day was had by all involved and we certainly enjoyed hosting our visitors to our school.









#### Should caning be reintroduced in modern schools?

Caning is an 'old school method of punishment used in high schools for those who are defiant or disruptive. This was quite a controversial punishment, but some people believe it should be brought back into schools as it achieves good behaviour worldwide.

The child was hit once on the backside or hands (palms or knuckles - which is much less common) as punishment. This made the child associate their bad behaviour with pain of the cane remaining for the entire day. The students then learned to respect the teachers and staff as they were in control of the class, rather than the class in control of the teacher. The cane would cause other kids to learn by example and not become like those who were badly behaved. The cane was phased out in the late 1960s to the late 1980s because of parental disagreement and individuals believing it was a form of child abuse.

I believe the cane would be effective in modern schools because it seems discipline in children has decreased over the years with the methods of punishment being used. This was because of the way media has portrayed

it. Some of these methods include; detention, cleaning desks/school grounds, writing lines, isolation and being stood down. These methods of punishment were also used alongside the cane for minor offence, but did not have the same effect alone. If the offence was serious enough, the student would be sent to the Principal to discuss whether the cane would be needed or not. If so, the Principal or another staff member would carry out the appropriate method of punishment for that particular offence.

The idea of rewarding a child for good behaviour rather than punishing them for bad behaviour does not motivate the child as well to change their attitude about school. These methods don't affect the child as much to give them a reason to change, but to simply not get caught. I also believe that school staff have very little 'rights' towards punishing children these days. Due to the law and restrictions to the school are words and warnings.

There is always a risk with any form of punishment that the student may resent the school or their teachers because of the way they are being treated. The student must understand that the cane is being used on By Kelly Mace

them for their own benefit and helping them rather than hurting them. The association with school and fear should no longer be existent because the students should understand the beneficial purpose of the cane. This includes keeping them out of trouble and setting a good example. It becomes a student's choice whether they are caned because the student is making that decision for his or herself when choosing to behave badly.

Another obstacle to the cane being reintroduced is caning females as it is frowned upon in society, especially since it was never given to females when it originally existed. However, girls can be as violent as boys in this generation, and it is an often quoted fact that women have higher pain thresholds than men. An alternative could be the strap, but a female teacher administering the cane is also an option, for obvious reasons.



As shown in the pictures along with focuses on literacy and numeracy our students worked on cooking, wood-carving, weaving, art, sports and



On Monday 22nd September, the juniors in the kapahaka group along with the Te Kura Kaupapa Māori o Nga Ringaomatariki went on a trip to extend learning about the impact of war on Māori that has been our focus for 2014 in recognition of 100 years since WWI started. Our first stop was Tokoroa High School where we made lasting impressions on our Cook Island hosts. We were lucky enough to learn about hydro-electricity onboard the Huka Jet in Taupo before we continued our journey to the Waiouru Army Camp where we stayed for 3 nights learning about the rigors of army life, the immense pride of Ngati Tumatauenga and the huge sacrifice our service men make for all of us "civvies." We went tobogganing down Ruapehu, snowball hurling and snowmen making. Then on our final day we heard a legend about Ruapehu and the other maunga in the Central Plateau. It was an exhilarating week of fun-filled activities that helped impress upon us the value of the NZ forces. Ka mate he toa, ka ara mai he toa: When one warrior falls, another rises in his place. We would like to acknowledge the support received from the Maungaturoto Opportunity Shop, who helped give our students the opportunity to be enriched by the experience. Aroha mai, aroha atu.













E ngā maunga tapu, e ngā pou whakairo, ānei te mihi. Ko Te Kura Tuarua o Otamatea e whakamānawa atu ki a koutou. Ko Ngā Uri o Ngā Waka e tū mai nei ki te whakaatu i tō mātou kaha ki ngā mahi a Te Rehia.

The OHS kapahaka group, Ngā Uri o Ngā Waka participated in Te Tai Tokerau Festival held at Rodney College this year. In 2014 we based the entire bracket on pakanga or war. We were lucky enough to have all of our wānanga at the matua marae of Te Uri o Hau: Waikaretu Marae, Arapaoa Marae, Otamatea Marae and Oruawharo Marae and we were able to ask what the impact of soldiers going to WWI and WWII had on those marae.

We started with a waiata called Pō Atarau which is to the Now is the Hour tune in memory of the anguish whānau felt when their loved ones left to fight abroad.

The entrance showed the anguish a woman feels when her love is wrenched away from her to go to war and him marching off to war.

The action song was a medley of 2 songs that were written by Sir Apirana Ngata and Ngoi Pēwhairangi in celebration of the feats of the 28th Māori Batallion.

During WWII there was a drought of young eligible men as they were away at war, and an influx of soldiers from America who came to Aotearoa. While the cats away the mice will play. The poi is about the relationships that eventuated between some NZ women and G.I's.

The haka is a commentary on the negative effects of war on Māori in particular. It was a heavy price for Māori to pay for citizenship. Effects of shell shock, drinking, domestic violence, loss of language and the breakdown of the family unit, spread through the communities that had men partake in war.

After the separation of Ranginui and Papatuanuku, their children had a war that ravaged Aotearoa. They fought incessantly until a daughter of Tane Mahuta, Hinepūtehue, caught the winds of hate swirling around and turned them into music. Music is the catalyst that ended the war between the atua. We acknowledge the sacrifice our soldiers have made for us and their continued efforts to keep peace now.



Ekore mātou e warewaretia! We will remember them!

# Otago Uni Science Wananga




Blowing up things, hands on fire, levitating ojects, laser beams, chemical clock experiments, electricity, magnetism, watertesting quality, liquid nitrogen ice cream making competitions and astronomy were just some of the science kaupapa demonstrated over the 3 days of the year 10 science wānanga, run in partnership by the Ngati Whatua rūnanga and experts in science from Otago University that 8 year 10 students attended in Tinopai along with students from Dargaville, Ruawai and TKKM o Ngaringaomatariki at the end of term 3. We had high quality teaching by some of the most knowledgeable people in their field and they were doing all they could to hook the students into the subject that they know and love: science. It was interactive. engaging and highly entertaining. Ngā mihi Otago University and Te Rūnanga o Ngati Whatua.



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It has been another successful year for the mathematics department.

This year the Otamatea High School Board of Trustees has funded the online tutoring programme Maths Whizz into the junior school at Otamatea. Students using Whizz for more than 60 minutes per week showed accelerated learning. The Year 7 cohort showed the most significant improvement. This cohort used Maths Whizz well averaging over 73 minutes of usage per week. Over 71% of Year 7 students were increasing their maths age at a greater rate than the corresponding increase in their chronological age.

The mathematics department has continued to evolve their usage of digital resources to enrich maths learning programs. Digital resources explored this year included edmodo, google classroom, glogster, google sites and other google apps. Staff and students were delighted with the addition of 30 chrome-books to D-Block that enabled students to have more access to online learning opportunities.

Year 7 and Year 8 students enjoyed hands-on maths projects and tasks we completed this year. One of the projects students seemed to enjoy immensely was the wharekai project. They had to create a scaled drawing and 3D model of a wharekai (dining room) to seat 40 guests. Their measurements and calculations had to be perfect to ensure their wharekai extension could be built next to the whare classroom. Other fun tasks included a Year 7 geometry Easter race. Students had to follow geometry position and orientation clues to find a hidden orange card and had to complete geometry quiz cards to get their Easter

We had an exceptional large group of students taking level 2 statistics, resulting in two classes this year. Many of our seniors aimed for merit and excellence endorsement this year and we are



looking forward to the external results.

We competed in the Northland Mathex competition held Friday 16th May at Whangarei Boys High School.

Maths Staff were very impressed with the number of students keen to participate in Mathex

Mathex Y9 1st place Natalie Birt, Annmarie Holst, Ewan Smith and Claude Smyth. Mathex Y8 2nd place Mya Lawrence, Jeremy McCallum, Pasindu Mudannayaka and Mason Wintle

There were 31 students from Year 8 to Year 11 who participated in the 2014 Otago University Junior Maths Competition. Ewan Smyth placed in the top 200 in New Zealand, a commendable achievement.

Next year we will be launching our mathematics department site that will have information for parents and links for students to resources and learning tools.

We are looking forward to 2015.

It goes without saying that the stress of exam time can take its toll on our students, and the pressure of workload can often seem overwhelming. We know that a certain amount of pressure is a helpful motivator, but too much stress can have damaging effects on our wellbeing. People often come to counselling to explore 'stress management', and I personally enjoy the idea that there are things that we can do for ourselves to increase our experience of wellbeing.

Managing stress is an art form which many of us are still refining (I'm speaking for myself here), and we each have different techniques which work for us. However, if I was to point to few, there are some factors which it seems we share.

Observing our breath can offer a good reminder to **BREATHE WELL.** It's such a simple thing that we often overlook the importance of relaxed deep breathing which in turn helps to relax the nervous system. I just love the availability of this tool, which can used anywhere and can help to make stressful situations seem more manageable.

**EATING** enough, and eating nourishing food, and drinking plenty of water are crucial factors in raising our mood levels, and improving brain function. When mood level is good, motivation is much easier to find!

A good night's **SLEEP** is invaluable for helping us to manage stress, and study productively. One of my good friends is a highly skilled naturopath and when she works with people who are having difficulty sleeping one of the first things she suggests is avoiding screen time at least one hour before bed, as computer technology can interfere with brain waves. I know its common amongst young people to continue to use devices even once they've gone to bed, but there's plenty of research which points to look! the benefits of changing these habits.

Having an Irish cultural heritage there's one final factor that I attribute strongly to wellness and stress reduction, and that's LAUGHTER. Where I come from. an abundance of humour has been used as an antidote to life's struggles since the beginning of time. So, remember to make time for socialising with friends

and enjoying the lighter side of life in amongst all that study time. Laughter promotes wellness on both a physical and mental level, and a balance of study and relaxation are necessary for optimum performance.

None of these ideas are new, but it's good to be reminded of the simple tools available to each of us when life seems a little overwhelming!
