This was a challenging activity that resulted in some fairly creative clips and gave students an opportunity to learn something new, work as a group and be creative.



Kia ora koutou,

Congratulations to all the students who have worked diligently this year. Well done on your achievements whether it is academic, sporting, cultural or in the arts. Each certificate, prize and trophy signifies a huge amount of hard work and dedication. The fact that there were over 90 different prizewinners at Senior Prizegiving represents the range of students striving to reach their potential.

2018 has been a year of consolidation. We started the year with another set of outstanding NCEA results, achieving over 90% pass rates in NCEA Levels 1 and 2 and very close in NCEA Level 3, with an 89.3% pass rate. Expectations have been high and students have once again risen to the challenge. It has been a pleasure reading the report comments recently and noticing the number of students who have secured their qualification prior to the external exams, many also securing overall endorsements.

Consolidation also occured this year in our inter iwi competition as we added new challenges. Mathex, debating and stop motion animation have brought a new flavour and have appealed to a wider audience. In the final month of the year the juniors will battle it out in the inaugural My Iwi Rules The Kitchen and the Big Quiz before final iwi results for the year are announced at Junior Prizegiving.

In the sporting arena we have gone from strength to strength, one of the highlights being the Reporoa Exchange which we hosted again this year. We came away with the shield for the third year in a row, coming back from being 3-0 down to winning 4-3. The girls' football team represented well this year winning their competition and the senior floorball team retained their title. The touch team also took out their competition. The netball teams again did well in their various competitions with the AIMs team getting publicity in the New Zealand Herald and once again winning us a special prize. Due to their efforts, Tom Walsh, New Zealand World Champion shot putter inspired our students and we were able to see what an Olympic Bronze and Commonwealth Gold Medal looked and felt like.

As usual our kapa haka group performed with pride at Te Tai Tokerau Festival and Te Uri o Hau Festival and we have been proud hosts to students from Japan, Thailand and Chile. Debating has really taken off this year with a number of debates with other local schools. We also won the inaugural Readers' Cup in Whāngarei.

The Duke of Edinburgh programme continues to offer our students amazing opportunities to develop their skill, determination, character and resilience. We are, in fact, so busy and successful I often find it difficult to keep up with the achievements and exactly who has done what. This is a good problem to have!

There have been moments this year though when we have had to dig deep and hold true to the school's whakatauki, He waka eke noa; we're all in the waka without exception. I would like to thank those people who have shown their support of the school in numerous ways. A number of senior students, along with staff members in support roles, have developed a new health council in the second half of the year. One main initiative of the Health Council is to support wellbeing, promote help seeking behaviours and encourage resilience. Due to this new intiative fifteen senior students have been trained in Lifekeepers which encourages us to CARE – Connect, Ask, Respond and Engage. Well done to this year's prefects and other senior students who were the catalyst for this and are now passing on the baton to the new group of prefects. You are leaving a real legacy. It has been really humbling to see these students advocate for this extremely important topic. I will leave you with a quote by Abraham Lincoln which has been popularised by Brene Brown, a motivational speaker who talks about courage, leadership and vulnerability. I have though made it more gender inclusive. This is for all of us, a reminder that it takes bravery and courage to be in the arena:

"It is not the critic who counts; not the person who points out how the strong person stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the person who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs, who comes short again and again, because there is no effort without error and shortcoming; but who does actually strive to do the deeds; who knows great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends themselves in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worst, if they fail, at least fails while daring greatly, so that their place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who neither know victory nor defeat."

Kia kaha, kia maia, kia manawanui. No reira, tena koutou, tena koutou, tena koutou katoa.

The 2018 year got off to a challenging start for the board and the senior management of the school. A complaint was made in relation to the safety issues of the asbestos removal in the tech block. This however has come at a very large cost to the school both in monetary value and time which should have been spent on our children's education.

Exciting news for the school going forward, is that the 10 year property plan has been completed and there will be some beneficial re-developments at Otamatea leading into 2019. This will allow the loading and unloading of the school buses in a much improved and safe area at the front of the school. A designated school zone and signage is in place already. The bus bay will be shifted along with the footpath to create a new footpath, bus lane and 1 meter pedestrian strip. None of these will encroach onto Bickerstaffe Road which will be safer for people using the buses and carpark across the road.

With such a large project being undertaken and the heavy machinery onsite the board has used this opportunity to redevelop the asphalt netball courts, driveway, car parking outside the Te Whare o Rongo and grass area outside the café and Whare Wananga. The car-parking area in front of the tech and administration blocks will also undergo a much needed redevelopment, along with the turning bay at the front of the school. These large projects have only been made possible to the funds we received from the sale of the surplus school housing.

Over the coming Christmas break the energy upgrade will be completed. This will provide the infrastructure to allow for the fitting of heat pumps and lighting upgrades throughout the school. It will also provide the capacity for future technology upgrades, when required. Due to the scope of works over this period and some essential reroofing the upgrades to B Block will be done at the end 2019.

I would like to thank all the staff at Otamatea High School for their continued dedication and professional approach to the education of our children. It is often a hard and thankless task they perform but an essential one. Without our educators and support staff our society as we know it would fail to function.

To the Board of Trustees I thank you for the hours of work you invest in the Governance for our school. We are responsible for providing the strategic direction of a multi-million dollar corporation who develops society's most valuable resources, our kids. With that in mind next year is the tri-annual elections for the Board. If you have any questions or feel that you can offer your time knowledge and expertise please come and speak to any of the board members.

With the end of a cycle it is inevitable that there will be change. I would like to thank Georgina Connelly for her time on the board. Alex Parr the student rep was an excellent contributor to the board and in all discussions. He represented the student body excellently over his tenure.

It is with great sadness that we will say goodbye to Libby Jones next year. She has worked tirelessly for the school and brought a great governance knowledge to the board. Libby's crowning achievement was the revamp of the school uniform which she spent countless hours on.

I would like to welcome Hayley Linton on to the board as the new student rep and look forward to her driving the student voice over the next year.

To the prize winners congratulations for a year of hard work and determination that has seen you achieve to the highest standards. The competition provided to you by your peers show that you truly deserve the accolades you are receiving today. Invest your time wisely and good luck.





The survivors lap starts the event with survivors of cancer, from all ages and backgrounds, coming together and walking around the track. It was especially emotional as some of our own were down on that track celebrating their victory over this awful disease.

As emotional as the event was, it was really special to share this weekend remembering those we have lost to cancer, and fighting for those who we know are fighting it right now. We were all able to support each other through this vulnerability, and it made us stronger as a group. A big congratulations goes out to Corey Slimo, Matthew Riddlestone and Alex Parr who all completed marathon distances (over 124 laps) during the event.

The other significant feature of the 18-hour relay was the remembrance lap. This was where we took the time to remember those who lost their fight against cancer. Everyone who participated in Relay for life was given a candle bag to decorate a few weeks prior to the event. During the remembrance lap, everyone's lanterns were placed around the walking track with candles lit inside them as a symbol of remembrance. We were all given a sprig of rosemary to carry for this lap, as rosemary is the symbolic herb of remembrance and hope. The reality of the impact of cancer really hit us as we walked around the track with only the light of the lanterns the whole way around the 400m track - there were so many lanterns - so many people who have been lost from our community.

We had an amazing time despite the rain and are proud to say that we raised over \$5000 as a group. Many thanks to all those who sponsored our team through our mufti day, bake sale and the donations given. A huge thank you goes out to Nikki, Mr Burnell and Natalie for the long hours they put into organising our team prior to and at this event, making it the great success that it was.



This year it included two shows:


1. Fire and Ice. Concepts of temperature and combustion.




The course offered at Otamatea High School is an innovative, practical programme for students, providing them with the skills and knowledge to springboard into any career in the construction industry.

The practical assessment in Year 12 is to engineer, construct and fabricate a Mini Motorbike using kits of engines, wheels, & body work. The task requires students to design and build their own frame, forks, and handlebars using a 50cc air cooled 2 stroke engine to power the motorbike.

Aftershocks is a piece of Verbatim theatre, which means it was created directly from interviews with the people who were working at the Newcastle Workers' Club that was destroyed in the 1989 Earthquake. 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


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## 2018 UNISS


