# **Principal's Comment**

We have recently received our confirmed Education Review Office (ERO) report from the review which was conducted at the beginning of term three. It was a very positive review and a positive endorsement of the school's direction. Outlined below are some snippets from the report. The full report can be found on the school's website and will be made available on the ERO website by the middle of the school holidays.

"The school's processes and actions effectively help to achieve excellence and equity for learners. This is mostly attributable to:

- a very positive and respectful school culture and tone
- powerful connections, relationships and partnerships with parents, whānau, iwi and hāpu
- effective school leadership
- sound governance and stewardship

Students benefit from systems that are strongly focussed on ensuring their wellbeing. A holistic, wrap around approach to pastoral care sits at the heart of the school's curriculum, setting the conditions for student wellbeing and achievement."

"Older students are good role models for their younger peers. The year 7 and 8 students have their own place and identity within the school. The school has good practices to support students transitioning into the school at year 7. These practices involve getting to know the learner and their family and support early identification of children at risk of not achieving."

"School leadership is very effectively building relational trust and collaboration at every level of the school community. The school's whakatauki 'He waka eke noa – all in the waka together', supports a shared comitment to promoting equity."

"Achievement information shows a very positive upward trend in students achieving success in the National Certificates of Education Achivement (NCEA) at Levels 1, 2 and 3. An increase in the number of endorsements is also significant. National standards data show the school is effective at accelerating students' progress in reading, writing and mathematics over the first two years in the school."

"Student engagement is monitored and this information shows that Māori students' participation is equitable across the curriculum in terms of attitudes and engagement as learners. Since the 2014 review the school has been successful in lifting retention and attendance rates and significantly lowering the number of stand downs and suspensions for all groups of students."

"Individual students are responded to through a range of cultural initiatives. These responses approaches value Māori language, culture and identity and are supporting students to make progress and achieve. A focus on broadening learning pathways in the senior school and these increasingly flexible responses to individuals are helping to lift the achievement levels of all learners."

"Individual learning plans are regularly revisited to monitor and build on the progress of students with high learning needs."

We are very proud of this report which reflects a real team effort – 'He waka eke noa, we're all in this waka, without exception'. Thanks once again to all the students, staff and community who have made this a reality at Otamatea High School.

# **Primary Industries Academy Travels to Kerikeri**



On the 14<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> of September the Primary Industries Academy had an overnight trip to Kerikeri to explore various career options in the area.

We first visited a goat milking farm of 2000 goats in Maungatapere owned by Allan and Lynne Karels. The goats were very friendly, particularly the kids which the students were allowed to get amongst, and a big hit with the students.

The next stop was Okaihau Pastural Ltd, a large scale, high input dairy farm of 1200 cows managed by Joe Foster. Joe was recently runner up in New Zealand Dairy Farm of the Year Awards and featured in the NZ Dairy Farmer magazine. We were shown the 60 bail rotary shed in action, covered feed pads where the cows were being fed a mixture which included lemons from the local orchards, and the effluent ponds.



The final stop of the day was at LD Packers where we had a tour of a fruit pack house and a neighbouring kiwifruit orchard.

That night we stayed at Kerikeri Holiday Park and Motels which was enjoyed and appreciated by all. Against all predictions the management of the holiday park are very happy for us to return next year.

The next day before returning to Otamatea we visited Turners and Growers, Kerikeri and were given a tour of their pack house and a lemon orchard.

By all accounts it was a great trip which was made possible by all the sites who generously hosted us. Thanks also to Sam Phillips who accompanied us and kept the girls in line.

# Reporoa College – Otamatea High School Sports Exchange 2017

Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> – Tuesday 15<sup>th</sup> August (52<sup>nd</sup> Annual Exchange)

The 52<sup>nd</sup> Annual Exchange took place at Reporoa this year with 55 Otamatea students travelling down for the occasion. Otamatea had won the Hathoway Family Shield for the last two years events so there was great excitement and pressure for us to keep the shield up North. This year saw our students staying at Reporoa College instead of being billeted out.

The first competition for the exchange was the hockey being held at Taupo Hockey Turf. This year the teams were mixed. With perfect weather and the Otamatea crowd behind them, the hockey team never looked threatened taking the win 8 -0 against a much younger Reporting Side. Goal scorers were Lee Holst, Aaron Lupton, Travis Flannagan, Hayley Linton and Isaac Sheppard.



Upon arrival at Reporoa the students settled into their class rooms which was to be their accommodation for the next two nights. Reporoa then put on an awesome spread for dinner.

On Sunday night, in front of a packed crowd, the girls' basketball teams tussled every quarter, with Otamatea up, then Reporoa ahead, then Otamatea again. In the last quarter with only 1 point in it, Reporoa scored with only 15 seconds to go to take the win 41 - 40. The boys game was a close game keeping the spectators on edge for the first three quarters. But the Reporoa boys found their form in the last quarter to take the lead and win by a comfortable margin of 36 -23.





Coming into the Monday, Reporoa held the lead 2 - 1 so the next five events would decide the end result. Otamatea started with a yummy breakfast to kick start the day.

# Maths Olympiad 3


5A. Time: 5 minutes What is the sum of all the prime numbers between 20 and 30?

**5B. Time: 5 minutes** Albert has twice as much money as Beth.

Beth has \$5 more than Carla. Carla has half as much money as Derek. Derek has \$6.

**5C. Time: 6 minutes** The figure shows three identical 11cm x 3cm rectangles that overlap to form two squares. What is the area of the U-shaped 8 –sided figure?

**5D. Time: 5 minutes** Three times Don's age plus two times Clair's age is 54. But three times Clair's age plus two times Don's age is 51. what is the combined age of Don and Clair?



**5E. Time: 7 minutes** Micheal is playing with a Magic Number Machine. A positive number is entered into the machine either subtracts 5 from the current number or doubles the number.

Michael enters a single-digit number into the machine and pushes the BUTTON four times. The results are 2, 4, 7 and 12 but not necessarily in that order. What single-digit number did Michael enter into the machine?

# Robyn Bruce – GOLD SERVICE – 28 years of service to hockey

Robyn Bruce began coaching hockey in 1981, which was her first year of teaching at Orewa School. She introduced hockey to the school with an all girls' team, and continued the following year with a girls and boys team. She continued coaching there until 1983, successfully gaining places for several students into North Shore representative teams, one of which she also coached during this time.

Robyn got married in 1984 and set off travelling, and then went on to have a family of four children. After taking a break to raise her children, she returned to coaching in 1992.

Robyn coached at JMC level for Maungaturoto Hockey Club, and acted as delegate to JMC meetings from 1993 until 2000. She also successfully served as chairperson of the NHA Collegiate Committee, delegate for Otamatea High School, and teacher in charge of

hockey from 2001 until the present time.

Over the past sixteen years, Robyn has continuously given her time coaching hockey teams at Otamatea High School. During this tenure we have enjoyed a top four placing in the NZHF secondary school tournaments on nine separate occasions at both boys and mixed hockey events around New Zealand, as well as celebrating four overall wins at these tournaments.



Further to her coaching commitments, Robyn also competed in hockey herself, firstly through secondary school for Hukerenui Club, and later for the North Shore Teachers College. All of Robyn's hockey games were played on grass fields, and she recalls fondly the occasions when umpires had to stop the game for players to wash mud out of their eyes.

Robyn has coached two Otamatea High School boys (Robert Bruce and Jareth Cocking) to U16 Tiger Turf National Teams, which involved those students participating in international games. As a result of Robyn's efforts, we have had numerous regional representative players through all grades from Otamatea High School, and we have also produced three age grade Northland goal keepers.

This will be Robyn's last year of coaching hockey at our school and she will be sorely missed. We will particularly miss her dedication to our hockey players and all of the knowledge that she brings to the game.

She will not be stopping her many hours of dedicated voluntary work as she will be continuing with her other passion - the Duke of Edinburgh Hillary Award Program. She currently has approximately 90 Otamatea High School students working on one of the three levels – Bronze, Silver or Gold, and as we recognise her commitment to school sport, we are also grateful for her ongoing contribution to the wider life of our school.



# Hockey New Zealand South Island Mixed Tournament Ashburton 4-8 September

This year our Mixed Hockey Tournament team of 16 players flew to Christchurch on Saturday 2<sup>nd</sup> September. We picked up our hire vans and drove via, Cookie Time at Tempelton, The church of Good Shepherd and the St John observatory lookout at Lake Tekapo to Glentanner Holiday Park, Mt Cook.
